

Join them as they try to escape and find a better life outside of the pan! We borrowed this from the library and had many rereads, giggling along the way. It will quickly work it's way to the top of your favourites pile (and stay there).

The illustrations are superb and you will want to spend the time devouring each page.

Read The Book Lemmings is a hilarious book by Ame Dyckman and Zachariah Ohora about the importance of reading! Foxy's book says that lemmings don't jump off cliffs. But the lemmings don't actually find this out because they haven't read the book! Captain Polar Bear and Foxy become increasingly frustrated that the lemmings don't seem to learn from their mistakes until Foxy realises that it's because they can't actually read...




Mrs Cooper recommends 'Something else' by Kathryn Cave & Chris Riddell

## Chapter books for younger readers



Rosie is all about resilience and learning from her mistakes, the perfect role model!



A delightful series for all readers to enjoy independently.




Miss Robinson recommends 'The Boy Who Grew Dragons'

## Spring into a books for older readers



Lisa Thompson is one of my favourite authors and I love the way that her novels tackle serious issues with a light-hearted touch.

Maxwell is the 'naughty boy' he's been branded with that label and he's finding it hard to shake it off. We slowly begin to see a softer side of him though, through his love for his dog 'Monster' and how he cares for his old neighbour. Unfortunately after a few disastrous events Maxwell wishes that he had never been born, he wasn't ready for the consequences of his wish. Can he right his wrongs? Can he find a way to be real again?

A Pinch of Magic by Michelle Harrison is a magical mystery that will hook you in. There are plenty of unexpected twists and turns that will leave you desperate to read on!

The story focuses in on three sisters who all yearn for a bit of adventure in their lives but none of them could have expected the adventure that laid ahead of them. There is a family curse that means none of the Wildershin's can leave their island. Can the sisters figure out how to break the curse before it is too late? There is more than just a pinch of magic in this novel, there are buckets of it!





Alex Sparrow by Jennifer Killick has been my surprise read of the year. I picked it up not knowing what to expect, but ended up loving every page of it!



He ends up watching an athletic team training at the local park and joins in a race to prove that they're not all that. He ends up being invited onto the team. Mrs Kimber recommends The Magician's Nephew by C S Lewis.

This is the prequel to the Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. My favourite of the Narnia Chronicles. It sets up the second book beautifully, explaining how the 'wardrobe' has been made and many other elements of the next story. However, it has a powerful, magical story all of its own. Digory and Polly find coloured rings which transport them into various dangerous worlds where they awaken statues, battle an evil witch queen, find apples that make you immortal and watch Aslan create his magical world. It's so exciting and beautifully written. A classic that every child should read.
